The Community of Blandford Forum, Dorset used £20,366 of P4C funding to improve access to the river Stour and Meadows - a rural area adjacent to the town. This was achieved by creating a disability access ramp from the main road, 40 metres of new flood resistant path, and improving the surfaces

of a further 300 metres of existing paths. The project has also created an interpretation board and three viewing areas by the river. All the 340 metres of path is being designated as footpath. The meadow, owned by North Dorset District Council is subject to frequent flooding by the River Stour, as was







illustrated during recent events when the river burst it's banks.

The ramp and new route were officially opened on the 25th January 2014 by the Mayor of Blandford: Councillor Brannigan. Local residents and visitors from further afield - with prams, mobility scooters, wheelchairs, and bicycles can now access the meadow to picnic, watch the resident otters - and use the improved path network to connect to the North Dorset Trailway.
