With your help, they'll blueprint your bogs, grade your grass, scale your streams and triangulate your trees. They need YOU to assist in the reconstruction, in miniature, of your community and put your village back on the map!

Show Two: Natural Values (Project Title)

- Funding application under review, decision Nov '13
- Working with national producers / artists
- Two different NIA Villages in north Devon
 - Bradworthy
 - Dolton
 - Woolsery
- First performances in north Devon Autumn '14

Performances will be developed by living in and working with local Northern Devon NIA communities and their surrounding landscapes. The developmental process will be supported by NIA advisors and partners. With local inclusion of people and their habitats. The aim is to create two different shows, which explore and reflect some of the core principles of all 12 NIA's including core habitats and the concept of **Ecosystem Services. Opportunity to test and pilot** new approaches to communicating NIA objectives, outcomes and messages to a broad and diverse audience.

Northern Devon NIA Outcome

- Two shows, four performances
- Developed in four NIA communities / parishes
- Exploring NIA concepts in different ways and
- Addressing a wide breadth of audience

Next Steps to Develop Joint Project

- Discuss / collaborate with other NIA's
- Submit funding bid to support a National Tour of NIA's Bureau of Extraordinance Survey - Autumn '14 Natural Values - Spring '15

Development of Funding Application

- Deadline end of Nov '13, outcome Jan '14
- Support from other NIA's + NE at national level
- Secure match funding
- Develop tour schedule for both shows

Proposed Model

- Support from at least 8 other NIA's
- Two performances of each show per NIA
- Show One Autumn 2014 / Show Two Spring 2015
- Each NIA agrees to support with £1K cash match
- NE at national level will also support with funds
- Secure additional match funding

If funding for a national tour of NIA's is secured, an opportunity will exist to work together to explore and assess the value of this type of arts based approach in supporting CES initiatives.

If performances are programmed with communities in your NIA, they can be programmed along side existing arts based initiatives and would be designed to be additive and complimentary.

The timeframe will enable the final performances to take place before the end of the 3rd NIA year.

Exciting opportunity to muster our collective resources to pilot the role of performing arts in the development of NIA's whilst supporting CES research and delivery.

Both shows will also tour <u>beyond the borders</u> of our NIA's areas, this will offer the opportunity to creatively spread the message of NIA's to <u>rural</u> and <u>urban audiences</u> as well as to key decision makers.
