

Paths for Communities - Project summary sheet:

Rodmell to Southease Bridleway

Project Location:	The South Downs
Right of Way Created:	Bridleway 800 m

Situated in the South Downs National Park, close to the south coast, the Ouse Valley runs southwards from the town of Lewes to the channel port of Newhaven. The long term aim is to link these two towns with a multi-user path following the River Ouse. One of the missing sections on this route was the one mile stretch between Rodmell

Village and Southease Bridge and local communities have used P4C funding to create a bridleway along this part of the route.

The bridleway has been constructed on the strip of land running between the river bank and a ditch, whilst the original footpath remains on top of the ditch to avoid conflict with walkers.







By opening up access to a network of bridleways from the South Downs Way, the new route is set to increase the number of visitors to the much-visited village green and historic Church at Southease Village. Although it is early days – the route having only opened in April 2014 - other local attractions and businesses likely to benefit include: the pub in rodmell village, various

'bed and breakfast' establishments, Monks House (National Trust), the local primary school, and a blacksmith. Close to the route is Southease Station with rail links to Lewes, Newhaven, Brighton and London. This is likely to bring more visitors to use the extended path



Youth Hostel (South Downs YHA) which opened in April 2013.

Other key partners have been SUSTRANS and the South Downs National Park (SDNP), with active support from a range of
