For many years an unofficial, very narrow and overgrown path was the only link for pedestrians in one part of Stoke by Nayland to reach their shops and amenities that avoided a dangerous piece of road. The local landowner of a privately-owned estate was happy to help the local community to keep safe, and encourage walking, by dedicating 302

metres of land permanently as a Public Right of Way footpath. With strong local support from the

Parish Council, and Suffolk County
Council Highways and Rights of Way
teams, an indefatigable volunteer
project manager, Vivienne Klimowicz
and an excellent contractor, Ray
Chisnall, the partnership worked hard
to comply with complex planning







requirements. This led to a change in the path specification to avoid damaging four protected Elm trees. The result is an all-weather surface, which the local community, including people with limited mobility and pushchair users, continued to enjoy – even in the winter downpours of 2013/14!

The path, which links to the long distance Stour Valley Path, was opened by local schoolchildren who now also have an off-road link direct from their school down to the community woodland, Rowley Woods. Suffolk County Council had completed the legal work creating the path before

the opening ceremony which was attended by all those involved in the project. Tea and cakes were enjoyed in the school hall courtesy the Friends of Stoke by Nayland primary school. Navigating successfully through the planning process was a key challenge for Vivienne as was convincing the

bank to exercise its powers to help with a short term loan to the Parish Council pending payment of their grant money.

Local goodwill was cited as a factor in the project's success and feedback on the path has been "so positive", according to Vivienne.
