JLAF profile

Tyne and Wear JLAF covers five separate Local Authorities North and South Tyneside, Gateshead, Newcastle and Sunderland with a combined population of over one million.

In April 2011there was some 457 miles of footpath, 181 miles bridleways, with 40 miles of redacted byway, and 1447 miles of cycle network. Oh and 0.5 miles of Byway open to all traffic. In addition to this significant lengths of local access network are available on council owned land / dedicated routes and through parks with unrestricted access. Formally recording these networks on the definitive map is an identified priority under the current Rights of Way Improvement Plan (ROWIP). There are only a couple of very small bits of open access land within our area but we do have some 40 miles of coast.

The ROWIP covers all five local authorities and was brought together as part of a Local Transport Plan by an integrated transport team based in Newcastle. The delivery of the ROWIP is down to each of the five separate authorities with their own Rights of Way Officers, maintenance teams and planning departments /teams. Each authority also produces their own plans for cycle strategies / green planning / local neighbourhoods etc., all of which have an effect on access issues.
