




Figure 7. Ancient wood-pasture with veteran trees at Farmcote (Cotswolds).




Figure 9. A veteran tree killed by car parking around it. Calke Abbey (Derbyshire).






Figure 13. Sweet chestnut trees at Croft Castle (Herefordshire). A standing dead tree is in the foreground and stag-headed trees behind.




Figure 14. The cut surface of a log showing internal boundaries in the timber.








Figure 22. A veteran hornbeam pollard at Hatfield Forest (Essex) being cut for the second time in recent years.
