Where to start?

Having robust insight and information on an area, its people and communities, heritage, culture and industry provides a backdrop on which a better understanding of challenges and opportunities can be built upon. For Protected Site Strategies, this is particularly important if the range of partnerships and communications chosen and worked upon are going to lead to the creation of a feasible, empathetic and deliverable approach.

The Green Infrastructure (GI) Mapping tool:


This gives more precise demographic and Green & Blue Infrastructure information along with designations and details of 15-minute walks to nature detail by postcode.



Green Infrastructure mapping


